







Development within 30.0 metres of streams is subject to *Riparian Areas Regulation*. This regulation requires biophysical assessments from qualified environmental professionals, who prescribe protective measures. From 2011 to 2016, there were **141 assessments** prepared in all four jurisdictions.



In the CVRD, there are environmental development permits to protect aquatic and riparian habitat, eagle nests and heron nests. From 2011 to 2016, **215 environmental development permits** were issued.







Airport and Ferry Passenger Levels


Annual Comox Valley Airport Passengers

BC Ferries Vehicle and Passenger Count at Little River Ferry Terminal










Number of Parcles in the ALR by Parcel Size in 2013




